

Mentor Holly worked with George during her time at The Bridge, working with him to create a small and supportive environment, helping him find purpose and routine in his day-to-day life, allowing George to thrive and enter back into mainstream school.

Through dedicated mentors like Holly and the Bridge Academy West, these institutions can provide essential support, encouragement, and guidance to help students find their focus and fulfill their potential.
